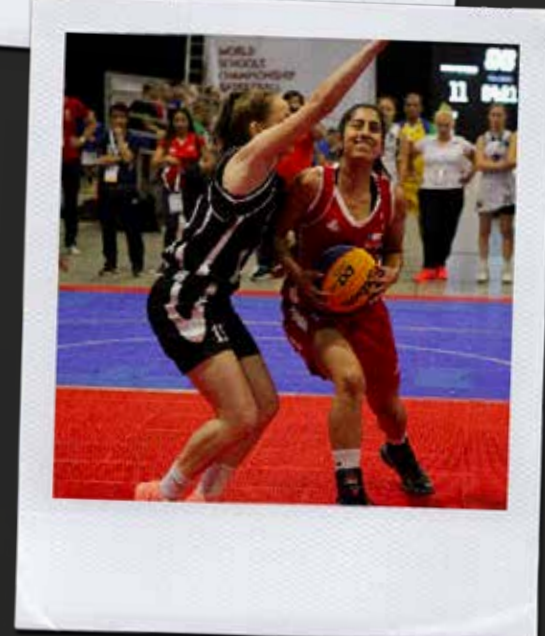
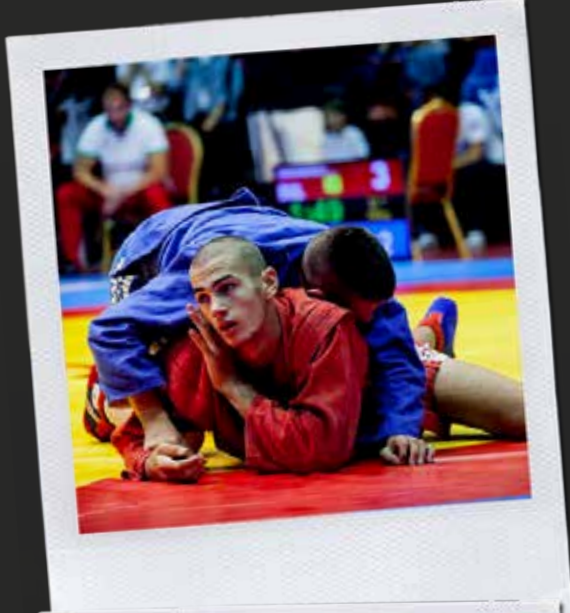

Dear Colleagues, dear friends,

Since ISF Executive Committee meeting in Brussels, five new member countries (Comoros, Guinea, Lithuania, Mauritania and Nepal) have been officially accepted into the ISF, raising the overall number of ISF members to 113. Like-minded sport and education professionals, leaders, experts, scientists, teachers, parents, and youth athletes, have conquered five continents of the World, and are now forming a global unity of school sport. The ISF community is getting bigger and stronger.

Among those very active members, we give a special thanks to the Russian Federation and its Russian School Sport Federation, under the guidance its President Mr Alan Abaev and his team, that hosted its first ISF event, and organised an inaugural, and extremely successful, World Schools Championship in Sambo.

She Runs project (Funded by the European Commission) promotes girls empowerment and female leadership through engaging young women in physical activity, using school sport as a tool for education. This year again, we have partnered with European Union's EU Week of Sport and joined the initiative first lead by Hungarian School Sport Federation – European School Sport Day (September 28). Soon we will have the honour to release the impact of this amazing campaign.

To evolve the federation further, we have been internally restructuring the ISF with a mission to accomplish all goals set within Vision 2030. We are excitedly awaiting the upcoming Executive Committee in Sochi in November 2018, where new ISF Committees will be presented, as well as the upcoming work programme of the ISF to move toward the goals of the ISF Vision 2030.

It's important we fully embrace the record-breaking year of 2018. But we must also look forward. 2019 is approaching and ISF is firmly committed to deliver another incredible season of school sport and its seasoned and inaugural ISF World Schools Championships; ISF flying-disc, ISF inclusive games, dancing and climbing will make their debut in 2019. While Jinjiang might still be two years away, preparations are in full flow. We are actively working towards Gymnasiade 2020 to provide our members with a fulfilling and once-in-a-lifetime ISF and School Sport experience.

Last but not least – I am thrilled to disclose, ISF once again has a "seat at the Olympic table", as the ISF had the honour to be reappointed as a member of the IOC Olympic Education Commission.

For all the achievements, I am greatly thankful for your contribution and the support you have been expressing throughout this year, and mandates before.

Poland + Bulgaria + Cyprus = Start now!



'Start now!' is a project which has been implemented since 2017 in the frame of Erasmus+: Strategic partnership for health promotion among the youth. The main objective is to promote a healthy lifestyle among youth of all ages from three countries – Poland (Health Related Organization for Promotion and Prevention "HOPP", Opole), Bulgaria (Bulgarian Sports Development Association, Sofia) and Cyprus (Social Policy and Action Organization, Nicosia). The innovative methods of non-formal education, divided into 5 modules with 3 degrees of difficulty, aim to change the attitudes of young people; to live healthier, promote physical activity, raise consciousness of environmental health and disease prevention. As the 'Start now!' programme assumes, 'the established [educational] method will be described in detail in the project's publication and distributed in European institutions. For the widest possible dissemination, the methods will be available in the form of an interactive and international youth portal. The closing actions of the project will be an international conference and Open Days presenting the results of a strategic partnership.'

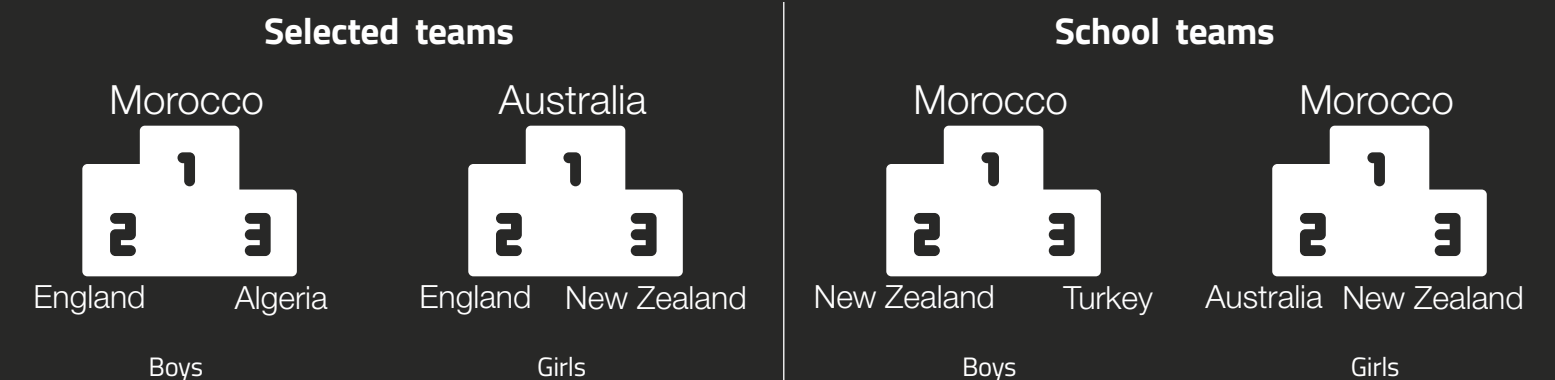

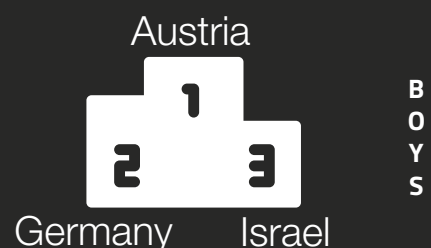

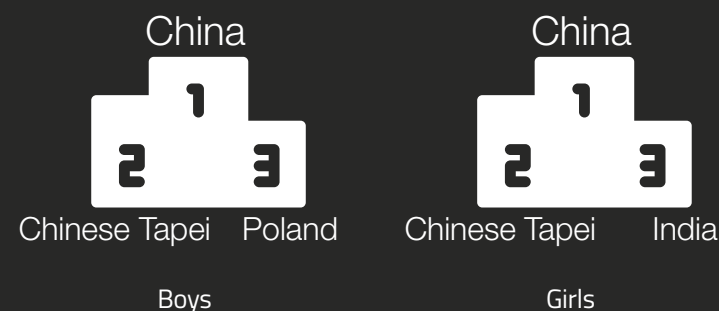

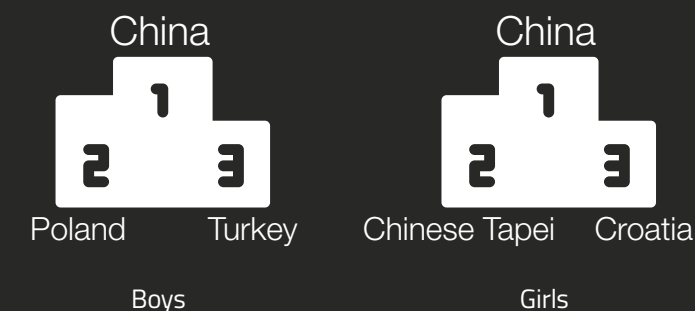

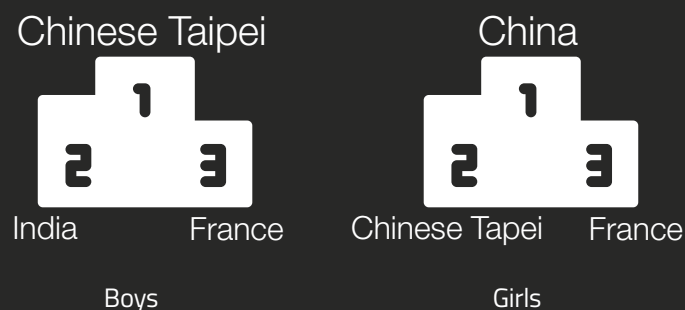

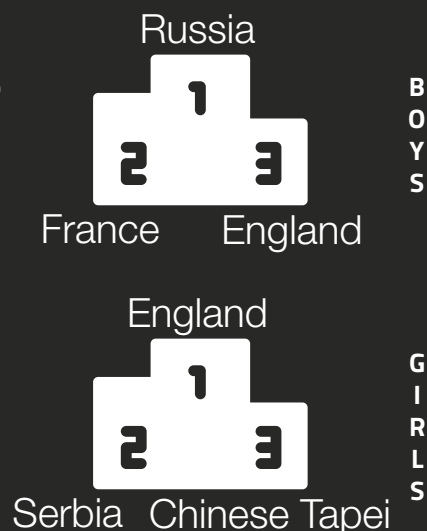

ISF EVENTS 2018

ISF School Winter Game

Before the world's elite athletes gathered in Pyeongchang for the 2018 Olympic Games, their younger counterparts met in Grenoble, France, for a 5-day multi-sport event which celebrated the unity between the legacy and ideals of Olympism, and the values of Education through Sport – ISF School Winter Games.



ISF WSC Handball

For the first time ever, the World School Championship (WSC) in handball was being held outside of Europe. To be exact, the 24th edition of WSC Handball was hosted by Doha, Qatar and organised by the Qatar School Sport Federation, Qatar Olympic Committee and Qatar Handball Association.

ISF WSC Futsal

Fifteen boys' and nine girls' teams gathered in Rishon LeZion, Israel, for a 6-day World School Championship (WSC) in futsal, hosted by Israeli School Sport Association in co-operation with the National Physical Education Supervision of Ministry of Education, Israel Football Association and the Municipality of Rishon LeZion.



ISF WSC Table Tennis

185 young table tennis players gathered at the 2018 ISF World School Championship (WSC) in Gzira, Malta, not only to compete but to engage in all activities 'Education through Sport' supports. The championship saw 49 teams, consisting of youth athletes aged 16-18yrs, from 20 countries and three continents, competing in 144 matches over the course of one week (April 8th - 14th).



ISF Educational Games

Athens were the epicentre of 'Education through Sport'; youth from all over the World travelled to the Greek capital to take part in the 5th ISF Educational Games. The event was organised by the Greek School Sport Federation and Greek Union of Graduates of Physical Education, and supported by ISF global partner Kinder+Sport.

ISF WSC Badminton

For the first time in the history of ISF, World Schools Championship (WSC) in badminton was held in India. The WSC was organised by the School Games Federation of India in cooperation with the Government of Maharashtra under the aegis of ISF.

ISF WSC Basketball

Youth athletes from 29 countries came to Belgrade for a week-long tournament and the 2018 edition of the ISF World Schools Championship (WSC) in 3x3 basketball, hosted by Serbian School Sport Federation. The championship was co-organised by the Serbian Ministry of Youth and Sport, the Basketball Federation of Serbia and endorsed by FIBA3x3.



ISF WSC Volleyball

Czech Republic School Sport Federation hosted the 2018 World School Championship in volleyball; with 28 countries, 28 girls and 27 boy's teams, attending. The WSC was organised with a support from the Czech Ministry of Education, Youth and Sport and the Brno City Council.

ISF WSC Sambo

Young athletes from all over the World gathered in Oryol, Russian Federation, for the inaugural World Schools Championships in sambo. With support of the International Sambo Federation and International School Sport Federation and Russian School Sport Federation «The Youth of Russia» delivered a high level organised tournament with over 200 young athletes competing in the event for boys and girls.

THAILAND

From school sport to sport science, Thailand's Department of Physical Education is making sure that Thai youth and its adults get safe and quality access to regular physical activity.



The role of Thailand's Department of Physical Education, part of the Ministry of Tourism and Sports, is to promote and further develop sport, recreation, and sport science.

Dr Panya Hanlumyuang is the Director General of Thailand's Department of Physical Education, and also the ISF Continental President of Asia. Over the past

few decades, Dr Hanlumyuang gained valuable experience in sport and beyond, as a FIFA coach and referee, technical committee member for football at the 24th Universiade in Bangkok, and a member of a subcommittee at the 24th Sea Games, held in Nakhon Ratchasima.

The main goals of Thailand's Department of Physical Education are; promotion,



support, development, and increase of the quality of school sport and its competitions on national and international levels.

The system allows for the professionals to specifically identify talented individuals who later may represent Thailand on the international stage. The department also strives to provide opportunities for all youth to improve their physical, emotional, social, and mental well-being through the implementation of various sport and recreational activities.

A lot of focus goes to the research in sport science and sport technology, with the objective of improving competitions, creating improvements in the equipment and establishing services that are understood to be of quality for the public.

Last but not least, Thailand's Department of Physical Education is working on finding and evolving multiple sport leaders who are capable of serving as role models for Thai youth and the next generation of physical education professionals.

MEET EVGENIA

ISF intern and former Olympic athlete



"School Sport gave me a "first class ticket" to my future life"

27-year-old Evgenia Tetelbaum is a former Olympic athlete (Rio 2016) in synchronized swimming, originally from Ukraine, but has been living in Israel for the past 9 years. She is also an ISF intern / Sport Officer, and an Erasmus Mundus Masters student in the field of Sports Ethics and Integrity (MAiSI). Evgenia believes experiences gained through her work for ISF will further benefit her sport career development.

Besides being a professional athlete, her experiences also include working as a swim coach, providing students with high quality lessons on swimming, skills and water confidence, and as a sport manager at Maccabiah Games 2013, in Israel.

Get to know Evgenia better through the following interview:

WHAT IS YOUR SPORT BACKGROUND?

I started my career in sport at the age of 5 with rhythmic gymnastics and I did it for 4 years. In 2001, there was a European Junior championship in my city (Kharkov). I was 12, and it was the first time that I saw the competition in synchronized swimming, and simply fell in love with it.

My history of success in synchronized swimming is directly related to multiple years of training and my ability to lead. I have served as a participant in a number of World and European Championships and other events (Cups). I have also been a reserve at the 2012 Olympic Games in London, and participated at the 2016 Olympic Games in Rio De Janeiro.

**WHEN YOU WERE A TEENAGE (SCHOOL SPORT) ATHLETE; WHAT WERE SOME OF THE CHALLENGES YOU HAD TO FACE OR LESSONS YOU LEARNT, WHICH CAN HELP YOU TODAY WITH YOUR WORK FOR ISF AND ITS YOUTH?**

The main challenge for me as a school athlete was to find a balance between school and sport. When I started synchronized swimming I had two training sessions per day and it left little time for education. However, sport makes you stronger not only physically but also helps to build your character. Sport helped me to discipline myself and I understood that if I want anything to be done well I have to do my best and then to add a bit more. If I had to miss some classes at school because of the training or competition I studied by myself and my family also helped me in it. Therefore, I graduated from school with honours.

IN YOUR OPINION, OR BASED ON YOUR EXPERIENCES; WHY ARE PHYSICAL EDUCATION AND SCHOOL SPORT SO IMPORTANT FOR YOUTH?

Movement is life and education is a part of it. These are two inseparable things. Pierre de Coubertin said - education through sport- as he saw sport and physical activity as an essential part of the harmonious development of a human being. School is the best place for the start of such development.

For me, the benefits of the School Sport were helping me build up my character, dedication to the healthy lifestyle, opportunity for the development through the whole life, etc. In short - it gave me a "first class ticket" to my future life.

SHE RUNS

ACTIVE GIRLS' LEAD

New project, developed by the International Sport School Federation (ISF), with the support of the European Commission (Erasmus + Sport) and in collaboration with the French School Sport Federation (UNSS), is awaiting 3500 girls to join the girls' empowerment initiative using School Sport as a tool to develop leadership skills, gain knowledge on the importance of physical activity and later, take action within their own home communities.

In the 15-24 age group considerably more young men tend to exercise or play sport on a regular basis as opposed to young women.

To reach gender equality, it is crucial to prepare the ground for girls, as early as possible, to become the women who can achieve their dreams. We are convinced that school can be a safe and inspiring environment that facilitates youth development equally. We consider sport as a soft and dynamic tool that allows young people to discover themselves and their abilities.

Since "80% of school age student engage in physical activity only at school"*, school sport offers the best space to launch innovative initiatives promoting equal participation in sport between women and men.

Divided in several activities, She Runs will gather 3500 girls students coming from more than 40 countries and aged between 13 and 18 years old.

They will:

- **ENGAGE IN PHYSICAL ACTIVITIES AND PROMOTE IT**
- **GET KNOWLEDGE AND ACQUIRE NEW COMPETENCES**
- **VOICE THEIR EXPERIENCE AND TAKE ACTION IN THEIR LOCAL COMMUNITIES**
- **STRENGTHEN THEIR INVOLVEMENT WITH THE NATIONAL SCHOOL SPORT ORGANISATION**

The first edition will take place in Paris, from March 12th to 17th, 2019, the week following the International Women's Day promoted by UN Women. More activities will take place in Croatia, Estonia and France.

The outcomes will be presented at the She Runs "The Impact Conference" which will take place in Brussels or Helsinki during the European Week of Sport Framework, involving experts from European and international organisations /institutions.

INTERVIEW with ISF Executive Committee member

MR ALAN ABAEV

School Sport in Russian Federation and beyond

Russian School Sport Federation recently hosted its first international competition under the aegis of ISF - a very successful World Schools Championships in sambo. With a high-level of organization and friendly hospitality, the event gathered almost 300 participants from 22 countries. The key player behind it was the president of "Youth of Russia" and the ISF Executive Committee member Mr Alan Abaev.

ISF talked to Mr Abaev to find out how he sees his role in developing School Sport in Russian Federation and beyond and his newly elected position in the ISF Executive Committee.

YOU HAVE BEEN INVOLVED IN SCHOOL SPORT FOR MANY YEARS. WHY DID YOU DECIDE TO RUN FOR A POSITION IN THE ISF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE?

I am the President of "Youth of Russia", an organization which is a member of the International School Sport Federation since 1992 upon a recommendation of the Ministry of Education of the Russian Federation. We started our cooperation with an aim of assisting young Russian athletes in participation in various international sport competitions and events.

It is important to note that this year "Youth of Russia" organized a sport competition under the aegis of ISF for the very first time. The ISF World Schools Championship in sambo took place in the Russian Federation, in the city of Oryol. Next in our forthcoming plan is the hosting of the 2019 ISF World Schools Championship in dance.

I am convinced that in order to be more effective in organizational matters and to be more actively involved in the ISF activities, Russian Federation should have a representative at the Executive Committee.

ACCORDING TO YOU, WHAT ARE THE SPECIALITIES OF ISF, AND IN WHICH FIELD DO YOU THINK ISF CAN GROW AND IMPROVE ITSELF?

I suppose that improvement of ISF is closely associated with the number of participants in ISF World Schools Championships and Gymnasiades (ISF School Summer/Winter Games), and with the growing number of ISF member countries.

CAN YOU PLEASE EXPLAIN HOW YOU SEE THE DEVELOPMENT OF SCHOOL SPORT IN THE RUSSIAN FEDERATION; WHAT ARE SOME OF THE UPCOMING EVENTS?

School sport is well developed in the Russian Federation. Many competitions in various sports are being held every year. But the participation of Russian school athletes in international competitions is not as intensive as we would like it to be. I am sure that the further development of school sport in the Russian Federation is closely related to the more active participation of young athletes in international sport events.

RUSSIAN SCHOOL SPORT FEDERATION ORGANISED THE FIRST EVER ISF WSC SAMBO IN ORYOL; WHAT IS YOUR IMPRESSION OF THE EVENT?

We were very happy to host the ISF World Schools Championship in sambo. Twenty-



two countries took part in it. It is a great achievement, not only for "Youth of Russia", but also for International School Sport Federation. The championship was very well organized and I am sure that the next ISF sport competitions in our country will be organized at the same or even higher level.

YOU HAVE A LOT OF EXPERIENCES IN SPORT AS AN ATHLETE AND AS A LEADER; ACCORDING TO YOU, WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS OF SCHOOL SPORT FOR YOUTH? WHY DO YOU THINK SPORT IS NECESSARY FOR THE YOUNG PEOPLE?

First of all, sports form a healthy lifestyle and discipline. Sport teaches responsibility and helps young people to socialize. Participation of young athletes in international competitions teaches them the respect for foreign and different cultures, and fosters tolerance and patience.

WHAT ARE SOME OF THE LESSONS YOU HAVE LEARNT THROUGHOUT YOUR SPORT CAREER WHICH YOU WOULD LIKE TO TRANSFER OR TEACH TO YOUNG ISF ATHLETES?

Sport results are achieved not only by talent, but by daily, and hard, work. I wish all young school athletes a great future in which they will win many victories!

SPREADING FAIR PLAY VALUES AMONG SCHOOL SPORT YOUTH

MoU with International Fair Play Committee

On the occasion of the International Fair Play Committee (IFPC) meeting, held in Baku on 19 September 2018, the MoU between ISF and IFPC was signed. ISF is placing a great deal of importance on the youth and its fair and respectful attitude towards sport.



At every ISF event a Joy of Moving trophy for Fair Play is awarded and each member of the awarded team receives a medal for a fair and friendly attitude towards its fellow competitors and the competition organisers.

The values of fair play, that are encompassing the Olympic values, are also the core values of ISF. The cooperation with the IFPC is another milestone in spreading these values, especially among

the youngest generation of athletes and students.

The IFPC is strongly dedicated to addressing key issues regarding the adverse behaviour in sport, and to spreading the message of fair play among the youth. ISF aims to be one of IFPC's most valuable partners in developing effective strategies to educate young athletes on the importance of fair play values, such as mutual understanding,

tolerance and camaraderie.

The MoU will be honoured with the IFPC logo being integrated on all ISF fair play medals and various educational activities being held on the site of ISF World Schools Championships.

The IFPC was established as the International Committee for the Organisation of the Pierre de Coubertin Fair Play Awards in Paris on 5th December, 1963, by representatives of United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organisation (UNESCO), International Sports Press Association (AIPS), International Committee for Sport Science and Physical Education (ICSSPE), and the International Federations of Basketball, Football, Rugby and Wrestling.

To educate on the values of fair play, the IFPC aims to influence the behaviour of athletes, coaches, parents, physical education teachers, referees, sports fans, and since September 2018, through the partnership with ISF, also its youngest audience – the School Sport youth.
